Background and overview

The Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) last reviewed Edith Cowan University's (ECU) suite of undergraduate Level 1, fourth year Level 2 and postgraduate packaged Level 3 and 4 psychology programs for the purpose of re-accreditation in 2015.

At the time of the 2015 review, the Level 1 and Level 2 programs offered at the Joondalup campus and online were accredited without conditions for a period of five years. The packaged Level 3 and 4 Clinical Masters program was accredited for a shortened period of time, as a small number of shortfalls were identified against the Accreditation Standards. Subsequent to the review, the Masters program satisfied all outstanding conditions imposed on the program and has since been accredited without conditions.

Since the last review, ECU has undertaken a major academic redesign and from January 2015 a revised structure comprising eight schools replaced the former faculty structure. The new structure has been reported to deliver better discipline alignment, a streamlined academic organisational model that enhances academic performance, and more responsive and effective decision-making.

The previously accredited set of single and double major undergraduate programs containing accredited sequence of psychology units has since been placed in teach out and is being replaced by a new set of Level 1 programs from 2020. ECU currently offers six programs at Level 1, two programs at Level 2 and one packaged Level 3 and 4 program in Clinical psychology. Additionally, the Discipline is teaching out the superseded Level 1 sequence in nine single- and double-degree programs and the superseded packaged Level 3 and 4 sequence in Clinical psychology, Forensic psychology and combined Clinical/Forensic psychology programs.

The Assessment Team considered the Discipline of Psychology, School of Arts and Humanities' 181 page self-review and attached appendices against the Accreditation Standards. The Assessment Team teleconference was held on 21 April 2020. The information subsequently requested was received from the Discipline prior to the virtual site visit.

The Assessment Team viewed a pre-recorded guided tour of the clinic and training centre at the Psychological Services Centre located at the ECU Health Centre on Dundebar Road, Wanneroo. The Assessment team was also provided with pre-recorded video tour and explanation of the resources and test kits available at the Psychology Test Library located at the ECU campus in Joondalup.

Prior to the virtual site visit the Assessment Team was provided with additional information including:

- Assessment samples for Level 1, Level 2, and packaged Level 3 and 4 programs
- COVID-19 placement changes detailing an alternative model of external and internal placement arrangements, checklist for students'
 external supervision and guidelines for telehealth from students' home

Student written reflections

The APAC Assessment Team conducted a virtual site visit on 26 - 28 May 2020. During the virtual site visit the Assessment Team interviewed a range of individuals via Zoom teleconference, including:

During the virtual site visit, the Assessment Team was provided with supplementary information including copies of incoming staff curriculum vitaes, unconfirmed minutes of the meeting of the Undergraduate and Honours Consultative Committee from 17 April 2020, responses to an anonymous survey circulated to interviewees who were unable to attend scheduled interview sessions, as well as documentation used at the clinic, such as a sample of a client file organisational sheet and a copy of the random file audit from 2017 spreadsheet.



Key findings

ECU has a strong focus on learning and teaching. Each of the psychology programs is built on the scientist practitioner model, whereby students are constantly exposed to the scientific basis and methodologies of the discipline, learn to be critical and reflective consumers of evidence, and learn to apply psychological theory and evidence to their own lives and real-world issues.

The evidence gathered by the Assessment Team indicates that ECU's packaged Level 3 and 4 program produces graduates who are competent to practice across a range of settings. The assessment processes are robust and mechanisms are in place to identify students that require support and extra opportunities to demonstrate competencies.

Students have ready access to support services and are provided with regular feedback on assessments. Evidence gathered by the Assessment Team indicates that the mechanisms in place to incorporate student feedback into the design and delivery of the program are working well. It is evident that there is an openness to gathering and acting on feedback from students, with examples of how the Level 2 program has been improved as a result of this feedback. The Discipline recognises that its programs would benefit from a more systematic method of incorporating external input into the design and management of its programs, and have commenced undertaking external benchmarking activities in addition to the planned five yearly course review. Recent changes made to its units within the Honours program and the processes put in place to strengthen the area of incorporating external input into the programs demonstrates ECU's commitment to continuous improvement.

The Assessment Team identified a number of commendable aspects. The facilities for clinical education at the ECU Health Centre are purpose built, very well resourced and fit for purpose. Throughout the virtual site visit, the Assessment Team was impressed with the supportive and collegial relationships of the teaching and professional staff including senior management. The Discipline is commended for their openness, availability and the level of support provided to students. The Assessment Team was impressed by the way in which the Masters program prepared students for practice ensuring students gain a good grounding in experiential learning, skill development and reflective practice. The Assessment Team also commends the Associate Dean Psychology and Criminology for the outstanding quality of leadership displayed; it is evident that consistent support, guidance and leadership is being offered within the Discipline.

The Assessment team identified a small number of opportunities for further quality improvement. The Masters program might build on current practice by exploring the opportunity for students to have further inter-professional experiences and collaboration with other health professionals. The Assessment Team identified that feedback students received on assessments were inconsistent between units and recommends a mechanism to be put in place to ensure consistency in feedback across all units within programs. It is suggested that the Discipline investigates the use of a digital online placement application such as Inplace or Sonia to track placement information. The Discipline should consider ways in which to expand and strengthen the training provided in cultural competency and responsiveness, and suggests the inclusion and representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) peoples on the Consultative Committees. It is also recommended that the Discipline should formalise a process to identify and develop the academic staffing profile as a means of succession planning.

1. To ensure that the Standard 3 Program of study, criterion 3.6 is met, the Discipline is to provide evidence of contemporary and effective methods of learning and teaching across all units.

For the packaged Level 3 and 4 programs

By 31 December 2021:

- 1. To ensure that the Standard 3 Program of study, criterion 3.1 is met, the Discipline is required to provide outcomes of the review of the Program and plans to ensure that a coherent education pedagogy informs the documented program design and delivery.
- 2. To ensure that the Standard 3 Program of study, criterion 3.9 is met, the Discipline is required to provide details of the teaching, assessment information and marking rubric for PSY5213 that demonstrates coverage of interprofessional practice.

For Level 1 and packaged Level 3 and 4 programs
